

Porg Christmas Ornament



Porgs! The latest adorable Star Wars creature slash merchandising ploy is here, so naturally I had to make some. They are quick and easy to make, and small so you can make them into Christmas ornaments – or just make a tiny army of them to hang out in your home. I won't judge.

Supplies

- Worsted weight yarn (Red Heart Super Saver or similar): Light brown, white, small amount of orange
- Small amount of black and white felt for eyes
- Small amount of darker brown yarn or embroidery thread for face
- Red yarn or ribbon to make a hanger (if you want it to be an ornament)
- Size G / 4.25 crochet hook
- Darning needle
- Craft glue
- Scissors
- Fiberfill stuffing

Abbreviations / Techniques Used

All details below are based on US crochet terms.

Magic Circle

Ch: Chain

SC: Single Crochet

Inc: Increase

Dec: Decrease

You will be working in a continuous spiral throughout, starting with a magic circle. Use a stitch marker and do not join rounds or turn (unless otherwise stated). All stitches are in single crochet unless otherwise noted.

Head & Body

The head and body are worked as a single piece. You will start at the top of the head with the light brown for a few rounds, and then switch back and forth between the brown and white to create the face & belly of the Porg. The pattern decreases to the neck, and then increases again with the body colours. For the colour changes, you can either cut your yarn for each colour change and then tie the ends together (they are hidden inside anyway), or carry the second colour along behind. The brown may show through the white if you carry it behind, though, so it's best to cut & tie.

Brown (main body colour) – B

White (face/belly) - W

Starting from the top of the head:

1. B Magic Circle = 6
2. B Inc every stitch = 12
3. (B 1, B Inc) x 5, W 1, W Inc = 18
4. B 14, W 4 = 18
5. W 1, B 13, W 4 = 18
6. W 2, B 12, W 4 = 18
7. W 2, B 12, W 4 = 18
8. W 1, W Dec, (B 1, B Dec) x 4, W 1, W Dec = 12
9. W 1, W Inc, (B 1, B Inc) x 3, B 1, B/W Inc (first stitch of the increase in brown, second stitch of the increase in white), W 1, W Inc = 18
10. W 4, B 10, W 4 = 18
11. W 5, B 8, W 5 = 18
12. W 2, W Inc, W 2, B Inc, (B 2, B Inc) x 2, B 1, W 1, W Inc, W 2, W Inc = 24
13. W 6, B 11, W 7 = 24
14. W 6, B 11, W 7 = 24
15. W 2, W Dec, W 2, B Dec, (B 2, B Dec) x 2, B 1, W 1, W Dec, W 2, W Dec = 18
16. W 1, W Dec, W 1, W Dec, (B 1, B Dec) x 4 = 12
17. B Dec x 6 = 6

Slip stitch to finish off, close up hole, and hide the end in the body. Tighten the hole at the top of the head as well and hide the end.

Wings (Make 2)

Brown

1. Magic Circle = 6
2. Inc every stitch = 12
3. SC 12 around
4. (SC 1, Dec) x 4 = 8
5. SC 8 around
6. SC 8 around
7. SC 8 around
8. (SC 1, Dec) x 2, SC 2 = 6

Slip stitch to finish off leaving a very long end. Close up the hole, flatten the wing, and use the end to sew around the edge of the wing to help it stay flat. Use the rest of the end to sew the wing to the body and hide the ends inside the body.

Feet (Make 2)

Orange

1. Magic Circle = 4
2. Inc every stitch = 8
3. SC 1, (Ch 3, then working down the chain SC 1, HDC 1, SL into next stitch) x 2 (to make 2 toes)

Slip stitch to finish off, leaving a long end. Sew the feet to the body and hide the ends inside the body.

Eyes & Face

For the eyes, I cut out two black circles and then two slightly larger white circles. Glue each black circle to a white circle and then glue on to the body. Use either dark brown yarn or dark brown embroidery thread to sew on the face details (nostrils and mouth), as seen in the picture.

If you want to make him into a Christmas ornament, then you can also thread a length of red yarn or red ribbon through the top of his head and tie it into a knot (or a nice bow!). Then he can hang out on your Christmas tree this year!
